CONTENT: Potential topics include: philosophy of science; statistical reasoning; psychological measurement; multiple regression; multivariate analysis of variance; discriminant analysis; canonical correlation; factor analysis; structural equation modeling; and meta-analysis.

FORMAT: This will be a seminar course with required readings and/or data analysis assignments for each class that will be discussed by the group.

COURSE MATERIALS: Some of the course readings will be from Field, Miles, and Field (2012), *Discovering statistics using R* (Sage). Other readings may be from the internet, from course-packs at the UBCO bookstore, or from the reserve section of the library. Most of the data analysis assignments will be conducted using R.

EXAMINATIONS: There will be two examinations based on the class readings and discussions: one in February and one in April.

LABS: The laboratory portion of the course will focus on data analyses using modern statistical software. Grades for the laboratory portion of the course will be earned in two ways. There will be quizzes, together worth 15% of the course grade. The quizzes will assess the ability to use statistical software, run appropriate analyses, and correctly interpret program output. There will be no make-up quizzes. A take-home assignment may be available at the end of term as a make-up for a quiz that was missed for a legitimate reason. 5% of the course grade will be based on lab attendance and on contributions to lab discussions. If you are to miss a lab for a legitimate reason, please notify Kimberley Kaseweter before the lab at kkaseweter@alumni.ubc.ca (do not use Connect email).

TERM PAPER: The term paper will involve writing a research proposal for a study that involves at least three statistical methods that are covered in the class readings.

Grades for class participation require verbal contributions to class discussions and demonstrations of familiarity with the course readings. Grades for class participation cannot be given for missed classes, for whatever reason, and will be adjusted accordingly.
