PSYO 343 (3) Psychopathology I

Detailed introduction to general principles underlying scientific study of mental health and psychopathology. Critical theoretical and methodological issues related to the assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of psychological disorders. Psychological disorders used to illustrate general issues and principles discussed. [3-0-0]

Prerequisite: Two of PSYO 219, PSYO 220, PSYO 230, PSYO 241, PSYO 252, PSYO 270, PSYO 271, PSYO 298, PSYO 299 or 6 credits of 200-level Psychology.

Course Format

The contents of the lectures will be determined by the course schedule (see below). PowerPoint slides will emphasize the key points of the chapters and will provide clarification and explanation of course concepts, including and beyond the textbook. Lectures will be recorded and posted weekly on *Canvas*. Skeleton slides will also be posted on *Canvas*. Online interactive discussion sessions will be held once monthly in *Zoom*. Additional learning materials are available through the *Launchpad* platform.

Course Overview, Content, and Objectives

This course explores the fundamentals of key areas of psychopathology, also known as abnormal psychology. This will serve as an introduction to specific disorders as well as key themes of empathy, resiliency, and treatment. This course will provide an overview of disorders, primarily through the DSM-5 diagnostic categories, with an emphasis on critical thinking and discussion in a virtual environment. Through multiple-choice questions, brief written responses, interaction, and reflection, course assessment will span the knowledge, comprehension, and application level of cognitive skills.



Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, students will be able to:

- Describe research designs and techniques used in clinical assessment and diagnosis
- Consider psychological disorders from the perspectives of the main models of abnormality
- Examine the impact of multiple factors (sociocultural, biological, psychological) on the development of disorders
- Evaluate psychological symptoms and construct your own understanding of “*abnormal*”
- Differentiate between psychological (anxiety, mood, substance, somatic psychosis, personality) disorders in adulthood
- Discuss the types and effectiveness of treatments for mental disorders

Evaluation Criteria and Grading

1. **Exams = 24% x 3 = 72% total**; Each exam will be non-cumulative and *closed-book*. The exams will consist of 80 multiple-choice questions completed over 105 minutes (1 hour 45 minutes) on Canvas Quiz using *Respondus LockDown Browser*. Each exam will include material from lecture, Canvas videos and discussions, and textbook material.

The examinations in this course are all closed-book, so you may **not** have access to any of the course materials, including your notes, during the exam. You are **not** to use any search engines or other programs – your browser will be locked in Canvas. You are **not** to take screenshots or pictures of the exam. Nor are you to communicate with anyone – you are to work independently. If you violate these conditions you have engaged in Academic Misconduct and will be subject to the consequences articulated in the Academic Integrity section. Communication with other students (written, text, verbal, etc.) is also not permitted and will constitute Academic Misconduct.

- a) **Exam #1: (24% of grade)**. This exam will cover Chapters 1-4 and lecture/Canvas material
 - b) **Exam #2: (24% of grade)**. This exam will cover Chapters 5-8 and lecture/Canvas material
 - c) **Exam #3: (24% of grade)**. This exam will cover Chapters 9-10, 12-13 and lecture/Canvas material
2. **Lecture-based quizzes/assignments, 10%**. There will be a brief weekly quiz/activity based on the lecture content (5-points each). I will be using quiz questions to keep you engaged with key concepts from the lecture. These will be available for a limited period of time; quizzes will be released with the lecture (Tuesday 9:00 AM) and due by Thursday afternoon at 4:00 PM. *Your lowest 2 performances will be dropped.*
 3. **LaunchPad text quizzes, 10%**. Text learning curves and quizzes will be assessed using the chapter questions in *LaunchPad*. **Learning curves will be based on completion, weekly quizzes will be graded based on accuracy.** You are strongly advised to do the assignments and quizzes the week the reading is assigned; however, *LaunchPad* quizzes will be due at 11:59 of the day of the first two midterms and on the final day of class (detailed in the schedule).
 4. **Monthly interactive review lecture activity, 8%**. As noted in the syllabus schedule, we will meet as a group in *live lecture on Zoom* once per month. Your mark in each review lecture will be half participation/attendance (i.e. 1.33%) and half completion of a brief activity (the other 1.33%). For those unable to attend, the brief activity or question(s) will be made available for 24 hours following each review.
 - a. **You have been assigned to a day (e.g. Tuesday or Thursday group) in Canvas under “People” in canvas in the “Review sessions” tab.** *Please attend your assigned day/time. If there is an issue with your assigned time due to your current time zone, please e-mail me prior to the first discussion meeting.*



- b. In these sessions we will review key concepts for the course section and you will have the opportunity to interact and discuss with your classmates while you complete a brief assignment.
